**From Our President**

MPC RETREAT JUNE 1998 Traverse City, Michigan

My purpose in writing this particular column is to convey something of the spirit of this gathering so that those who were not fortunate enough to attend might also share in the experience. This was a gathering that predominately focused on generating ideas and new directions for our institute. The process included considerable self-analysis. Our discussions were unusually lively and creative. We were able to support and contain considerable diversity and passion as we expressed our ideas and opinions. This plurality of ideas and enthusiastically held beliefs, well contained and nurtured, may be an important benchmark in our development as we continue to evolve and mature as an institute. Throughout the retreat emphasis on exploring what we could do to further the development of MPC always remained ascendant. We were more than a collection of individuals this weekend!

The spectacular view from the top of the Park Place Hotel, looking over Traverse City and Grand Traverse Bay, set the stage Friday evening June, 6 for what was to become a most enjoyable and constructive third triennial gathering of MPC. Our opening session on Saturday was convened jointly by myself and Dr. Ellen Toronto in order to illustrate the ongoing continuity and mutuality within our organization. Subsequently, Dr. Sophie Lovinger and Ms. Diane Drayson, representing Training and Certification, led a discussion. There was considerable controversy over the proposed "evaluationfeedback" procedure, with strong opinions by those supporting and those opposing such a process. A desire for the development of a child psychoanalysis program also received nearly unanimous support.

Following this meeting were separate forums for analysts and candidates lasting until noon. Issues discussed during the analyst's forum included: the need for intensifying our efforts towards developing regional study groups; ongoing training for MPC analysts; and

# About MPC

MPC is an interdisciplinary society for training and accreditation in psychoanalysis. There are two options for formal training for qualified individuals: a program in psychoanalysis and a program in psychoanalytic psychotherapy. The programs are based on the tripartite model of psychoanalytic education and feature (1) personal analysis or therapy, (2) supervision on treatment cases, and (3) coursework in theory and technique. Courses, monthly paper presentations, and special programs are offered in Ann Arbor, East Lansing, and elsewhere.

#### The Objectives of MPC are:

The study of psychoanalysis;

- The enhancement of public and scientific interest in psychoanalysis;
- The support of education and research programs in psychoanalysis;
- The establishment of standards and the certification of individuals qualified in psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy;
- The establishment of educational programs to train qualified individuals in psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy, and to award them a certificate upon graduation;
- The establishment of collaborative relations with other organizations with similar interests;
- The maintenance of a non-discriminatory policy regarding gender, race, age, religion, sexual orientation and ethnicity in membership and training.

what we might do to become more visible in our own communities; and a community lecture series.

After a break for lunch, we reconvened with Kathleen Koepele leading a discussion on programs. The spirit of collegiality which had developed in the morning continued. The idea of community education in East Lansing and Ann Arbor via the Community Lecture Series, mentioned that morning, stimulated much discussion. Mental health issues on topics ranging from family violence, to ADHD, to medication were proposed. Several members volunteered to facilitate the development of this speakers/ publication forum. Diverse suggestions as to future program year presenters were also made; Carol and Jim Gilligan, Judith Tabin, and Nancy Chodorow were included. In addition to the regular program year. Kathleen announced that plans are being explored for a summer symposium with Christopher Bollas at Oxford University, U.K., July of 1999.

Four abridged presentations, beginning with Dr. Ellen Toronto representing the Gender Issues Committee, followed. The post-modern deconstructionist analysis of the social construction of gender was emphasized by Dr. Toronto. Additionally, there was general agreement that we had accomplished much of what we set out to do nearly ten years ago. Dr. Brenda Lepisto presented ideas for reconfiguring the MPC Newsletter, and received enthusiastic support for the present format and her contribution as editor. There followed a brief discussion on "the impaired practitioner," led by Dr. Robert Hooberman, focusing on what constitutes an "impaired practitioner" and what might be done in such a case. Dr. Hooberman also announced that a committee was being formed to investigate how MPC might protect itself while being helpful to such a distressed person. The afternoon program concluded with a succinct discussion of several changes to the MPC By-Laws, led by Ms. Diane Drayson. These changes were referred to the board meeting Sunday morning.

The banquet began at 6:00 p.m., with those in attendance assembling for cocktails and conversation. We were accompanied by John Wunsch on the guitar. Dinner was served from 7:00 to 8:00, followed by the evening program which began with the introduction of new members and candidates. Next, Ms. Diane Drayson presented certificates to Dr. Frank Sollars and Dr. Evangeline Spindler. Dr. Spindler's letter of acceptance was read aloud, as she was unable to attend. Dr. Sollars eloquently expressed appreciation to his family and MPC. Afterwards, Dr. Sophie Lovinger presented certificates of appreciation to MPC teachers for the 1997-1998 academic year. Drs. Gibeau and Lovinger presented

each other with certificates, and a new tradition was begun.

The tribute to the Lovingers for their contributions to psychoanalysis and MPC followed. This was an exceptionally poignant event. Five MPC members openly expressed their respect and admiration to Drs. Sophie and Robert Lovinger. The tributes, one after another, were heart-felt and created a moment I will never forget. As I presented the plaques of appreciation on behalf of MPC and looked into numerous tear filled eyes, I thought that the capacity to respond to this loss in such a creative way surely represented a developmental achievement for our institute.

The evening culminated with a paper by Dr. Bertram Karon titled <u>Analyzability or the Ability to Analyze</u> which challenged the traditional question of whether or not an individual is analyzable with the "right question ....what needs to be done to make the person an analyzable patient?" It was, as always, a real treat to listen to Dr. Karon's ideas.

This memorable weekend concluded Sunday midmorning after a board meeting and farewell brunch.

#### **MEET THE CANDIDATES**

Patricia Marciniak is near the completion of her psychoanalytic training. Laura Noel was accepted into the program this past June.

Ms. Patricia Marciniak is a native of Michigan, and received both her B.A. and M.S.W. from the Michigan State University School of Social Work. She has worked extensively in the field of addictions, as Legal and Employee Assistance Liaison, Patient Advocate, Patient Rights Advisor, and also in Minority Substance Abuse issues. She was a primary therapist for St. Lawrence's Partial Hospitalization Program, being responsible for both group and individual therapy, as well as providing leadership for a nurse and family therapist in a 5-7 week program for a wide range of chemically addicted patients. She then moved to St. Lawrence's Psychological Services and Addictions Clinic where she served as an Outpatient Mental Health Therapist for two She has also provided testimony in civil and years. criminal addiction cases. While working for St. Lawrence, she began her private practice in East Lansing. She resigned from St. Lawrence for full time independent practice in 1992.

Ms. Marciniak has been an active member of the M.S.U. School of Social Work Alumni Board for the past three years, serving as chair of student development. Her four grown children and four grandchildren, who live in Michigan and Big Sur, occupy much of her leisure time. Other leisure interests are hiking, downhill skiing, photography, dance, film, and close friends.

She comments, "Designing and carrying out an independent study with Henry Krystal, M.D., on Psychoanalysis and Addictions was a pleasure, as it has enabled me to combine my experience in addiction treatment with a psychoanalysis and more importantly, deepen my understanding of the symptom constellation of addictions." She also comments, "I have an intense interest in the will to be analyzed and the treatment alliance, as well as a deep commitment to psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic training. I believe that each of us has the opportunity to offer our strengths and creativity to its development."

**Ms. Laura Noel,** a Michigan native, graduated with a B.S. from Grand Valley State University in 1981 and completed her A.M. in social work in 1988 at the University of Chicago. Currently she is in private practice in Saginaw, working with adolescents and adults. She has worked for Psychiatric Associates, the Visiting Nurse Association, and Norman Weslund Child Guidance Clinic, all in Saginaw. While working with the Visiting Nurse Associates, she noted the isolation of the visiting social workers, and organized a local chapter of Home Health Care Social Workers. Ms. Noel was also employed as an outpatient therapist for the Midland-Gladwin Community Mental Health Clinic. Prior to her masters degree, Ms. Noel had extensive experience working with battered women and their abused children as the Children's Services Coordinator of the YWCA Domestic Crisis Center in Grand Rapids. She also provided home intervention to highly dysfunctional families through the Grand Rapids Child Guidance Clinic.

She states, "Working in home treatment intervention illustrated the need for solid training. It became absolutely clear that I needed to learn more." Salvador Minuchin provided training in structural family therapy at that agency, and he indicated that he had spent twenty years doing psychoanalytic work, and that it was imperative for the therapist to understand the individual before intervening in family systems. Thus was Ms. Noel's interest in psychoanalysis piqued by a family therapist.

Through supervision with Dr. Sophie Lovinger, Ms. Noel made the decision to seek psychoanalytic training, and last year she participated in Dr. Lovinger's Children's Clinical Case Study Group. She said, "The work is difficult, isolating and sometimes stressful, you need colleagues to do it well--a place where you can talk about the work."

Ms. Noel lives with her husband, Steven Verburg and children, Emily, eight, and Walter, five, in Saginaw. She is busy with family, work and psychoanalytic training. When time allows, she enjoys weaving, sewing, camping and back packing.
